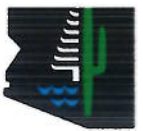

Background:

The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) provides matching grants for acquisition and development of public outdoor recreation facilities. All LWCF funding requires a minimum 50/50 match. Once LWCF funding has been used, a project area must remain open to outdoor recreation creating a legacy of outdoor recreation opportunities for generations to come.

Background:

Arizona State Parks and Trails is responsible for the completion of the Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) every five years per statute. This document is also required for the state to receive stateside assistance from the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), administered by the National Park Service. The SCORP is a compilation of information statewide on all outdoor recreation on public and some private lands across Arizona. The SCORP also identifies current issues in outdoor recreation and priorities for the next five years.

The 2023 Arizona SCORP was developed with data collected from stakeholders, Arizona residents, the recreating public and recreation providers across the state. The Plan is now ready for review and approval by the Arizona State Parks Board. This Plan includes the Open Project Selection Process (OPSP) based upon SCORP priorities, which will inform grant criteria for the distribution of the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund, and the state Heritage and State Lake Improvement Funds and may guide outdoor recreation related decision-making, resource allocation and management decisions statewide, across agencies and jurisdictions. Also, Arizona State Parks and Trails will be working with partners beginning in January 2023 to implement and track the SCORP goals, objectives and strategies through coordinated action that may meet multiple priorities across agencies in Arizona.

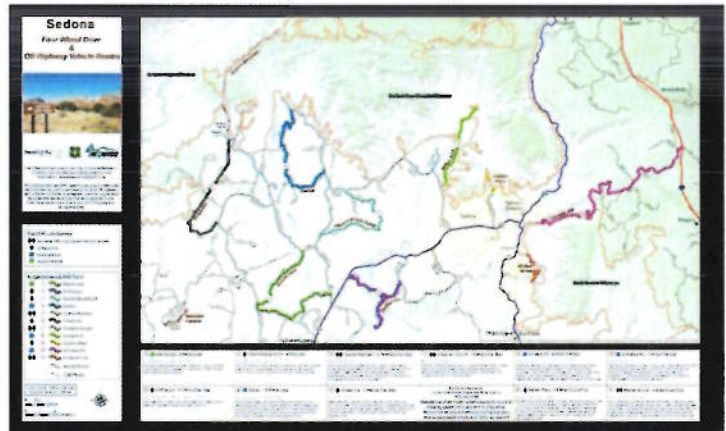

Competitive

Coconino National Forest: Red Rock Ranger District – OHV Program Development Funding Request – \$314,508.00



Project will hire a GS 6/7 OHV Lead and hire 2 GS-5 temporary employees. The project will coordinate on the ground efforts with the OHV cooperators, educate and enforce OHV regulations, provide ground operations maintenance of system routes and restoration projects. The project will also expand the volunteer program. The project will work with RROCC and Tread Lightly to broaden the outreach of public volunteer events and encourage more engagement from public community members, stakeholders, and OHV user groups.

Mohave County – Sawmill RV Park/Staging Area Development Funding Request – \$ 267,594.00



This grant will be used to have a cultural and environmental clearance survey completed, along with the planning/design engineering on a new recreational vehicle (RV) park and Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) staging area on the North side of Hualapai Mountain Park. This new RV park/staging area will accommodate more OHV users that frequent the park. The Hualapai Mountains attract thousands of OHV users with hundreds of miles of OHV trails.. This RV

park/staging area will allow users to stay in the area longer to access all the trails the mountain and connector trails. This would also be the only year-round RV park/staging area in the area. This plan for the new RV park/staging area will include connection to the existing and previously used OHV trails on the North side of the mountain which will bring users off Hualapai Mountain Road. A trail on the north side of the RV park/staging area will increase the safety of the users by getting them off the county highway and on to the trails sooner.

2023 Supplemental Motorized Applications

Bullhead Police Department – Law Enforcement Equipment Funding Request – \$100,000.00



The City of Bullhead City Police Department will utilize the funds to purchase two (2) side by side Off Highway Vehicles (OHV's) fitted with emergency light package. These OHV's will be utilized for the purpose of educating and enforcing the public on Arizona Off Highway Vehicle Laws and safety as well as enforcement of Arizona off highway regulations. Additionally, it is important to keep in mind that the trails within the City are high volume Off Highway Vehicle areas partially due to the many Off Highway Vehicle adventure rental companies in the area. 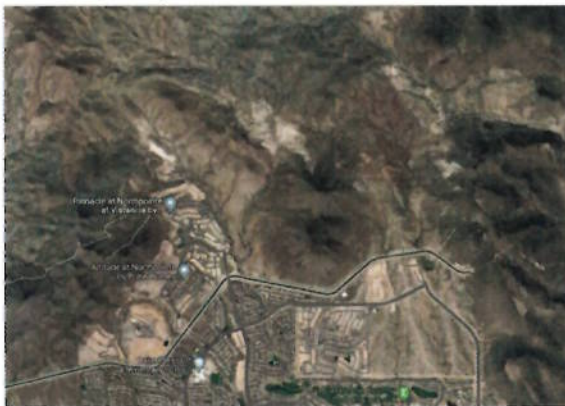
Coconino National Forest: Red Rock Ranger District – Law Enforcement Equipment

Coconino National Forest: Red Rock Ranger District is requesting funds to purchase a side by side, dirt bikes, trailer, traffic counters, tail cameras, radios, PPE to assist with OHV law enforcement, environmental resource protection, user education, and community outreach. This area of the state has seen a tremendous increase in OHV use due to the spectacular scenery, the increase in rental companies, and overall statewide increase in OHV use. This grant will be vital in educating the recreating public on proper OHV use and etiquette.

City of Peoria Police Department – Law Enforcement Overtime Funding Request – \$30,000.00

The Peoria Police Department is requesting funding for overtime details for Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) patrols. These patrols are dedicated to protecting the Peoria desert areas consisting mostly of State Trust land, through education of the OHV laws. The City of Peoria consists of 179 square miles, with approximately 122 miles of desert area. As the city continues to grow, significant increases in OHV activity have been seen in the desert areas. Since the start of 2022, the department has contacted well over 250 people and provided education and brochures on OHV law and regulations as well as safety. In addition to expanding efforts through the requested overtime detail funding, the Peoria Police Department has also teamed up with other agencies to help educate the individuals who are out utilizing the land. The overtime hours are estimated to be approximately 488 hours in additional enforcement.

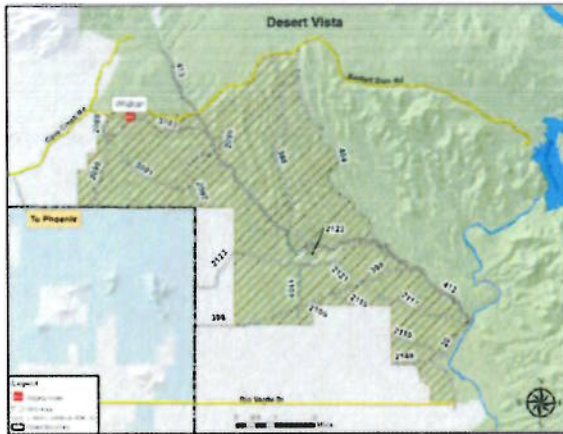
Pinal County Sheriff's Deputies are experiencing an influx of 9-1-1 generated calls for service in the Public Lands areas. Due to this influx the Pinal County Sheriff's Office has created a Range Unit to deal with the issues of the Public Lands, OHVs and Grazing Range. This unit will utilize a 3-step program to help combat the issues we are now faces with. These include education-Range Deputies will hold education programs for the public, through on-site Staging education. Schools, Rental Agencies. The county is partnering with AZGFD OHV, BLM and USFS LE Officers to join them in combined education programs. Range Deputies alone, and in, multi-agency details, with the above-named agencies will conduct on site patrol on a consistent basis for visibility, to educate and to warn. As a new specialty Law Enforcement Unit within the Pinal County Sheriff's Office and dedicated to a patrol area of approximately 1179 sq miles of Public Lands/OHVs. This money will be used to purchase the 2 LE packaged side by sides and 2 transport trailers

Funding Request – \$100,000.00**



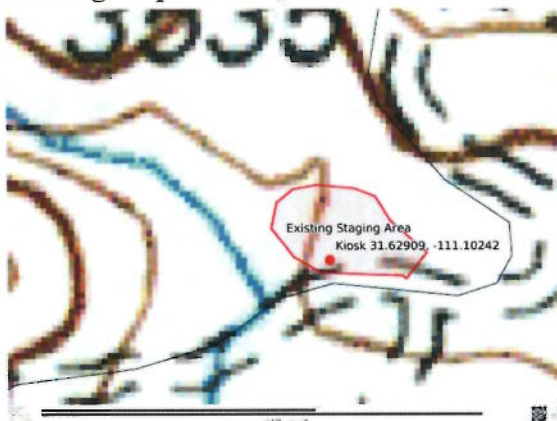

This OHV will be used by certified police officers and volunteers to respond to emergency and enforce OHV laws in and around a community fishing area, Patterson Ponds, and the trails and high desert areas located within the City that are used by OHV operators and passengers where traditional police vehicles will not normally be able to operate.

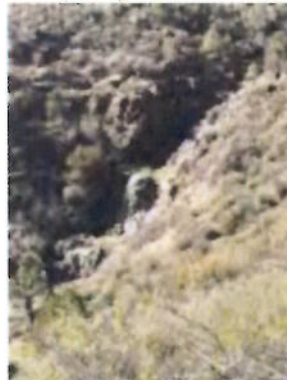

This proposal extends the trail work from Washington Park to the Tonto Fish Hatchery, and specifically, will address deferred maintenance needs on approximately 2.12 miles of trail and decommission and rehabilitate 6.4 miles trail. A trail crew will follow construction of rerouted trails and the former trail prism will be reclaimed to reduce lasting impacts to the watersheds that the Highline trail crosses. The former trail sections will be blocked to foot traffic. Compacted tread will be broken up and/or scarified by hand approximately 4 inches deep to allow native grasses, plants and seed to take hold and grow. In order to prevent further erosion on the trail bed the natural contour of the slope will be reestablished

Project Title: Copper Chief Trail Season 3

Grant Request: \$150,000.00—Match \$17,543—Total \$167,543.00



Due to its limited access points, rugged country and years of unmanaged recreation occurring along the planned trail corridor, the total project is planned to take at least three field seasons to complete. This Recreational Trails Program grant, augmented with other fundraising, will perform in 2023-2024 to include completion of the Copper Chief Trail and rehabilitation and

restoration of land in areas where illegal motorized and non-motorized routes are used along the construction corridor. All work will be done with a contracted trail crew.

Their current 1997 Boston Whaler has exceeded its life expectancy which was designed for law enforcement, provides no access to victims in the water, has poor lighting, no navigation, has failing communication and emergency lighting, and a pump is mounted in the front of the boat which makes water rescues much more difficult. The request for funding to purchase a new boat will provide protection to resources throughout the Colorado River from Davis Dam to Lake Havasu.

The park also includes two ballfields and a walking path. These additions to the park have been overwhelmingly received and park usage has skyrocketed. As a result, additional infrastructure is needed, specifically picnic ramadas, increased natural shade, and additional restrooms. Funding will be used for a new storage building and a new restroom which would be located adjacent to the new playground allowing for better access for park patrons. Oracle Community Park provides space for unstructured recreational play, picnicking, and community events and lacks ADA compliant parking spaces, pathways and restrooms. Additionally, the basketball court and playground structure are not sized appropriately for adequate community utilization. Funding will be used for improvements to include ADA parking and walkway, updated playground equipment, restroom improvements, a natural surface walking path and additional landscape and site improvements.

Project Title: Mountain Bike Program Support

Grant Request: \$50,000.00 Match-\$5,696.00 Total-\$55,696.00

This project is to support mountain biking recreation, education, safety, and engagement for residents of Colorado City (AZ) and the surrounding community. This grant will allow the current program to expand to reach more individuals. Project activities will primarily be targeted to youth and adolescents

involved or interested in the local high school mountain biking team. The community has a high percentage of people who suffer from obesity, inactivity, diabetes and hypertension. This project will aim to increase youth involvement and reduce the obesity rate for these individuals. The funding will be used to purchase bikes, safety equipment and a trailer to ensure local youth have increased access to equipment and needed for mountain biking. The trailer will be used to transport the bikes to allow access to areas to bike.

The roof had to be removed due to a microburst which caused severe damage earlier this year. The building has provided almost 100 years of service to the community. This would create a huge opportunity cost since it has a unique structure that is typically associated with the historic RT. 66 eclectic nostalgia and is located in a prime location to attract tourist. The immediate goal is to repair the roof to prevent further damage to the building and include future plans for improvements to the inside of the building.

This project replaces and upgrades HVAC systems at 134 and 128 N Railroad Ave., which are contributing buildings to the Railroad Avenue Historic District and used by Willcox Theater and Arts, Inc. which hold events daily. The HVAC system at 134 N Railroad Ave. is eight years old, and maintenance costs are significantly increasing. The replacement systems will have higher energy efficiency, improved air exchange to cycle air, optimize air flow patterns, and provide smart system control to maximize efficiency. These HVAC system replacements will not only control temperatures, but use engineered air flow patterns, air cycling, and air filtration to provide effective mitigation of airborne viral and bacterial particles. The systems feature the latest air filtration system, eliminating the viability of bacteria and virus through a UV-C light system.
