Bullhead City Project Overview





Family Fun Zone and Splash Pad (SLIF)

The new splash pad and Family Fun Zone located at the northern edge of Bullhead City's Community Park opened this summer
in June.

- The new splash pad features nighttime RGB LED lighting, multiple benches with shade covering, a rubberized life floor surface and water features for people of all ages, including a large water-dumping bucket and a slide.
- □ Water used by the splash pad is UV filtered, chlorinated and recirculated to conserve water and ensure public health is protected.
- □ In addition to play features, 60,000 square feet of artificial turf has been installed at the Family Fun Zone. The turf is calculated to save enough water to service more than 125 homes every year. After 25 years, the artificial turf will save enough water to supply 3,140 homes for one year.
- Four concrete cornhole games, Two triple-shot basketball games. And a concrete ladder toss (ladder golf) game.
- Two concrete ping pong tables,
 Two concrete foosball tables,
 Two concrete chess/checkers
 tables. And Two tetherball poles.

Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV)Law Enforcement Grant

- ☐ The City of Bullhead City submitted its Police Departments application for the for the Arizona State Parks (ASP) Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV)Law Enforcement Grant.
- ☐ Having being successfully awarded the funds were utilized to purchase (2) two side-by-side off-road vehicles and OHV equipment for off-road vehicle patrols.
- ☐ The trails within the Bullhead City are characterized with a high volume of Off Highway Vehicle areas partially due to the many Off Highway Vehicle adventure rental companies in the area. Furthermore, if awarded the Arizona State Parks OHV Law Enforcement Grant, the Bullhead City Police Department would be able to keep up their excellent support and routine coordination with BLM Law Enforcement Rangers on resource crimes and concerns occurring along Silver Creek Road and other areas.
- ☐ The City of Bullhead City is also planning on a OHV Stage, this will increase traffic and usability.

Bullhead City Fire Department (SLIF)

- Bullhead City is located on the Colorado River and is a major attraction for visitors that come to stay in Laughlin, NV. A portion of the river sees a heavy flow of jet ski's and tourists.
- ☐ This specific area accounts for the majority of the emergencies involving drownings, trauma and other related injuries. As a community that sees over 2,000,000 seasonal travelers annually, we have almost double the national average in calls for service per capita.
- Bullhead City is essentially an island in the desert that desperately needs funding to help support the response mission. We need a fire boat that can adequately sustain the need for service delivery. The boat will assist with water rescues, body recoveries, structure and wildland fires, and vessel assists.
- ☐ The project plan is focused around providing a fire boat that helps provide a safe and effective level of service to the community. The fire boat will be staffed with trained personnel that will assist and respond to medical emergencies, body recoveries, fire along the river and other various calls as needed.

Bullhead City Police Department (SLIF)


- Bullhead City is located on the Colorado River and is a major attraction for visitors that come to stay in Laughlin, NV. A portion of the river sees a heavy flow of jet ski's and tourists (2 million +/year).
- ☐ The project is a new 2023 Rogue Jet Boat (21') with trailer and equipment. A new patrol Rogue Jet Boat will update our fleet and retire an unsafe and barely operation 2008 boat. It will allow our department to add additional resources to one of the most dangerous stretches of the Colorado River. It will provide many years of service to the community and the waterway through a variety of patrol operations.
- A new Rogue patrol boat directly addresses the Safety/Law Enforcement Enhancement needs. Bullhead City Police Department patrols the Colorado River on the border of Arizona and Nevada. Patrol units operate from the Davis Dam (including the Davis Camp recreational area) approximately 13 miles south by the Nature Center (city limits). When needed, units will travel south further on the river to assist.
- □ The boats are also used by the Bullhead City Police Department Dive Team who conduct a variety of operations on the Colorado River and Lake Mohave. The Colorado River is highly populated during the summer months (May 1- October 1) and can be extremely dangerous to recreational activity. The patrol boat will be tasked with enforcement, emergency responses, vessel assists, visual presence, community interaction and education.

Bullhead ATV/OHV Staging Area

- ☐ City of Bullhead City was successfully awarded grant funding, which will be used to develop Bullhead City's first OHV staging area. The proposed OHV Staging area site is located at the corner of Silver Creek Road and Bullhead Parkway.
- ☐ The BLM Colorado River District and Black Mountains are adjacent to Bullhead City which provides off-road recreational opportunities to the residents and tourists alike. Over recent years, these areas have included abandoned OHV's, unsafe target shooting, and wild burro incidents. The site will be utilized for parking and off-loading OHV's for use on adjacent trail systems. Additionally, the staging area will be located adjacent to the Arizona Peace Trail, the largest OHV Loop Trail in the United States.
- ☐ The proposed Bullhead City OHV Staging Area is designed to accommodate the following type of motorized vehicles: Dirt Bikes, Off-Road Trucks, Quads (ATV's), Side-by-sides (UTV's), and Jeeps and similar 4-WD vehicles to name a few. An information kiosk will be provided on the restroom building for up-to-date trail information and related communication amongst other amenities.

City of Bullhead City Parks and Rec: Fishing Pier (SLIF)

- ☐ This project proposes to rehabilitate the estimated 25+ years fishing pier located in Rotary Park on the shores of Colorado River. This fishing pier is in disrepair and its foundation has eroded over the years, there is clear and substantial erosion in various places along its breakwater foundation.
- We submit this project for consideration for grant funding to be able to conduct the much-needed infrastructural improvements and address the parks maintenance to create a more enjoyable visitor experience that is safer. We want to create a welcoming environment for the public to come on in and enjoy and visit. This is to enhance the recreational experiences offered in the area both for locals and visitors.
- □ Project will consist of existing failing walkway and safety rails and replace failing safety lights and poles. New Walkway over graded and compacted area and up to 14" slurry over 4" walkway, new safety rails, up to 37 welding repairs and up 7 horizontal panel replacements. Up to 3 new light standards and LED poles. All work in to be confirmed to above High-Water mark. The fishing pier is currently ADA compliant and repairs will be completed to be in compliance with ADA.







Trail Use

- White Cliffs over the last 12 months 8,000 used the trail.
- We are expected to see increase as word gets out and access from multiple trailheads.
- A Social Media Group, **Chillin' on the Trail in Kingman Arizona**, has started leading groups on rides through the trail system for different rider levels.
- Our Kingman Main Street organization adopts the Wagon Wheels Trailhead.
- The City of Kingman holds one of their quarterly walks here.
- The Scouts and other organization utilize this area.

The Word is getting out about the White Cliffs Trail System

- John Richie from Bright Road Productions in Los Angeles was in town to film some footage at the White Cliffs Wagon Wheel Trail area, for the show "Homestead Rescue" He said, "I just finished scouting the area, and your trails our truly stunning. I really enjoyed hiking them."
- One of our PARG Commission members was in Flagstaff at the REI Store. When the clerk saw that she was from Kingman the clerk said "he'd heard that Kingman has great hiking and biking trails."
- A representative from CRATA said "Really excited about the White Cliff Trail expansion, These trails are built the right way and handled the rain well. Our other trails didn't fair well."

Strides Forward

- We are internally working on over hauling our trail information on our city website. There is so much great information to share.
- Once that is finished we will be reaching out to trail app services and websites to update our trails in their systems.
- Our goal is to provide easy information to further grow the usage of our trails. We would love to grow this to a non-motorized trail destination and create a culture around trails here in Kingman. Our previous mayor, Jen Miles, always used the phrase, "Hike it, Bike it," and we have incorporated that into our signage.

Upper Loop Trail | 2.3 miles, 223' Elevation gain | *Intermediate Level* This connects to the Lower Loop Trail. Users will experience a fun section of trail that takes them up onto the natural slick rock ledges with beautiful views and colorful lichens. This bi-directional trail completes the Lower and Upper Wagon Wheel Loops.

Lower Loop Trail | 1.1 miles | 112' Elevation Gain | *Beginner Level* | *This trail begins at the White Cliffs Wagon Wheels Trail head bypassing the Historic Wagon Wheels.* Users will experience a fun section of trail that takes them onto the natural slick rock ledges with beautiful views along the East and West basin below the Cliffs. This bi-directional trail completes the Lower and Upper Wagon Wheel Loops.

Doc's Trail; 1.11 miles | Beginner Level This trail branches off of the South end of the Lower Loop East Trail and weaves through a grove of Crucifixion Thorn before connecting to the Upper W.W. Loop Trail. **Doc's Trail**; grants access Cactus, Skyline, Jack Rabbit, Uptown and Downtown Connector Trails. **Doc's Trail** is **named in memory of Dr. John Lingenfelter**. The White Cliffs Trail System connecting downtown to uptown, linking all of these trails together would not have been possible without the donation of this 5-acre parcel (303-05-0006). It was not owned by the city and was crucial to the trail project. The Dr. John Lingenfelter trust was found to be the owner. The Lingenfelter trust was contacted and told of the importance of their parcel to this project and the community. Two days later the city was notified that the parcel was being donated by the Lingenfelter trust for this project.

Quail 0.29 miles | Beginner Level This beginner level trail that grants access to Cactus, and Skyline Loop Trails. **Quail** weaves through a grove of Crucifixion Thorn before beginning its climb up to the top of the White Cliffs along the natural contours of the landscape. Mild grades and stunning views grant users with a new perspective of the area.

Lower Quail 0.25 | a little more Challenging then the Quail Trail especially for bikers.

Spicy Pickle / A Directional Trail | .1 miles | Expert Level This unique trail will be bi-directional for hikers, but as the name suggests, bikers will want to only tackle it from the top. The only true directional trail on the system, Directional presents riders with a technical down hill from the very start. Riders will have to demonstrate excellent bike control as they descend steep slick rock for 35ft. before entering an armored banking turn. This will be a gem within the system for experienced riders far and wide. The Directional Trail will also present a valuable opportunity for ACE to work closely with volunteers from the local community

Cactus | 0.3 miles | Beginner Level Resting in a small basin on top of the White Cliffs this loop will be a spring time must. A relaxing loop that weaves its way through barrel, prickly pear, and cholla cacti this gentle loop rewards hikers with lovely views and access to the top of the White Cliffs

Skyline Technical Loop | .7 miles | Advanced Trail Skyline provides visitors with a whole new experience within the White Cliffs Trail System. Branching off of the relaxing Cactus Loop, Skyline starts out with dirt single track before moving up onto world class slick rock. Skyline quickly earns its name as users traverse the canyon ridge with gorgeous views in all directions. Users will be rewarded with expert grade mountain biking and slick rock hiking a top the White Cliffs overlooking the Trail Head, I-40 and Coyote Pass.

Ledges | .72 miles | Intermediate Level One of the longer loops on the system, Ledges follows the natural contouring of the landscape as it traverses the slopes of a small volcanic high point. Ledges provides riders with a lower level intermediate experience that will entertain cyclists and hikers alike. Users who start at the southern junction of ledges will find themselves weaving through cat claw, crucifixion thorn, and cacti along dirt single with the white cliffs off to the left before crossing over an old two-track road and onto the slick rock ledges from which the trail gets it's name. Accessible from both of its termini, ledges is a fun bi-directional trail for those new to intermediate riding and hiking

Wash Trail | .27 miles | Intermediate Level Wash Trail is a unique experience within the White Cliffs Trail System. This bi-directional trail presents both a challenging climb and heart pounding down hill through a slick rock wash. The top of the Wash Trail can be accessed .18 miles from the southern end of Ledges. Riders and hikers will have a gentle traverse across a steep cross-slope before dropping down into the slick rock wash. The trail weaves back and forth across the slick rock all the way back to it's junction with Uptown Connector Trail.

Jack Rabbit |0.36 miles | Beginner Level Branching off of Quail, Jack Rabbit is a fun loop for the casual hiker and beginner mountain biker. This bi-directional loop breaks away from the slick rock that frequents the rest of the system. Reaching its highest point atop a saddle that provides a overhead view of Historic Downtown Kingman, this trail has something for everyone from fun downhill riding to relaxing nature walks.

Golf Course Technical and Transect | 1.01 miles | Advanced Level The second of our technical loops, the 1.01 mile long Golf Course Technical Trail presents far more challenging slick rock riding for the experienced mountain biker as well as amore adventurous experience for hikers and trail runners. The trail follows the natural contouring of the landscape switching from high exposure single track to slick rock slots that require precision riding. Users can tackle this loop from either direction depending on their preference, and with the Transect Trail connecting the loop midway users can further customize their experience. Open to foot traffic as well, the trail will take users right to the edge of the cliffs overlooking the Cerbat Cliffs Golf Course

Uptown Connector | .73 miles | Intermediate Trail The beginning of the connector trail from the Cerbat Cliffs Golf Course to Historic Downtown Kingman, **Uptown Connector** starts moving south from the driving range. It works its way along slick rock pans as it climbs up to the Ledges Trail Junction. Continuing along the trail traverses the desert slopes with the natural undulations of the terrain. **Uptown Connector** provides breathtaking views of the Hualapai Mountains as it skirts along the rim of small box canyons leading users past enticing trail junctions as they make their way from the course towards downtown. This bi-directional trail links the historic downtown area with the golf course. The final connection at the golf course passes between a small mesa and the driving range to the Golf Course parking. To ensure the safety of our trail users, the trail runs out side of the driving along and in close proximity to the driving range safety fence and netting.

Dad Jumps | This unique Directional trail presents riders with a technical down hill jumps. Riders will have to demonstrate excellent bike control as they descend the steep jumps.

Ghost Pepper Trail | A Directional Trail | .1 miles | Expert Level This unique trail will be bi-directional for hikers, but bikers will want to only tackle it from the top. This true directional trail presents riders with a technical down hill from the very start. Riders will have to demonstrate excellent bike control as they descend steep slick rock for 35ft. before entering an armored banking turn. This is a gem within the system for experienced riders far and wide. This Trail presented a valuable opportunity for ACE to work closely with volunteers from our local community.

Chuckwallas Loop | .5 miles | This is a mellow flowy bi-directional trail for hikers and bikers with some optional lines of varying degree. There is one small rock gap jump that is off the marked main line but is fun and easily made in either direction. This Trail presented a valuable opportunity for ACE to work closely with CRATA Members who's vision this was and volunteers from our local community who built the trail.

Jalapeno Roll | .2 miles | This is a directional trail off of the Caucus Loop for bikers with a varying degree of difficulty and a Bi-Directional trail for hikers with some beautiful views.






FY 2024 Budget and Fund Balance

SLIF FY 24 Balance and Budget













SPRF Revenue & Expenditures




SPRF FY 23 Expenditures by Category
