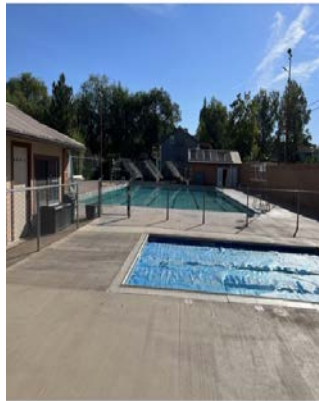

Our primary focus is addressing asbestos abatement, as an environmental study has identified asbestos in the ceiling and roof. An abatement company has assessed the situation and provided an estimate for this crucial task. Furthermore, the roof is in dire need of replacement, having deteriorated significantly over the years, leading to constant leaks within the building. We have consulted with three roofing companies to obtain estimates for the roof replacement.

The Rialto Theatre Foundation seeks support for the critical renovation and replacement of the roof and ceiling structure of the more than 100-year-old historic Rialto Theatre, a cultural cornerstone in Tucson's downtown arts and culture corridor. The Rialto Theatre hosts live music, diverse arts programming, and youth education captivating nearly 300,000 residents and visitors annually. Over time, the roof's degradation has led to water infiltration, damaging the roof and interior ceiling structure. Despite previous repair efforts, an expert assessment underscores the necessity of a comprehensive re-roof to preserve the building's integrity. The project will involve removing the existing 12,700SQ.FT roof system down to the deck, the installation of new roof, sealing of electrical, mechanical duct, pipes, vents and roof projections, and the repair of interior ceiling damaged by roof leaks using high-quality, historically-sensitive materials to maintain the architectural authenticity of the building.

St Philip's In The Hills Episcopal Church was founded in 1936 built in the style of 20th Century Spanish Colonial/Mission Revival architecture (also called Neo-Mission) St Philip's is modeled after the Franciscan mission churches built in California over 400 years ago. As the congregation grew, the Sanctuary maintained the integrity of Joesler's design through several expansions occurring in 1940, 1947, 1951 and 1957. The oldest building now faces significant structural challenges, especially with respect to roofs and walls. This stems primarily from the use of historical building materials, especially handmade Mexican clay roof tiles kilned during the mid-20th century and mud adobe walls built from local materials. A recently completed assessment conducted by Advanced Reserve Solutions has identified work totaling nearly \$900,000 to stem the effects of weather induced damage and deterioration. The buildings requiring this work house millions of dollars of irreplaceable artwork and artifacts, including stained glass windows from Mexico that date to the inception of the church. Key to the protection of these priceless pieces of art and artifacts is the ability of the exterior envelope to keep out the elements, particularly rainwater. The buildings not only host church services but provide the community music performances throughout the year. In addition, the buildings host art exhibits which along with the architecture of the buildings including the stained glass which are open to the public.

Mission San Xavier was one of the first sites in the nation to be listed as a national historic landmark. In the 1990's conservators were brought in from Europe to accomplish the first-ever conservation of the art within the historic Mission. That initial work involved stabilization of the plaster surfaces supporting the artwork and cleaning and conserving the fragile painted surfaces. The current project involves the highest sections of the church, the interiors of the ornately painted dome and drum above the crossing. This work will involve a major scaffold. Work consists of: assessing and treating areas where moisture may be impacting plaster surfaces, reattaching and stabilizing plaster that is delaminating from the substrate, removing plasters, cleaning the painted surfaces, in-painting to soften voids

Rehabilitation work will involve foundation underpinning, adobe stabilization and repair, exterior lime plastering, replacing the buildings' roof including the addition of interior structural roof supports, restoration of windows, doors, electrical, and ADA compliance. Tech students will assist with the goals of community engagement and sparking their interest in historic preservation.

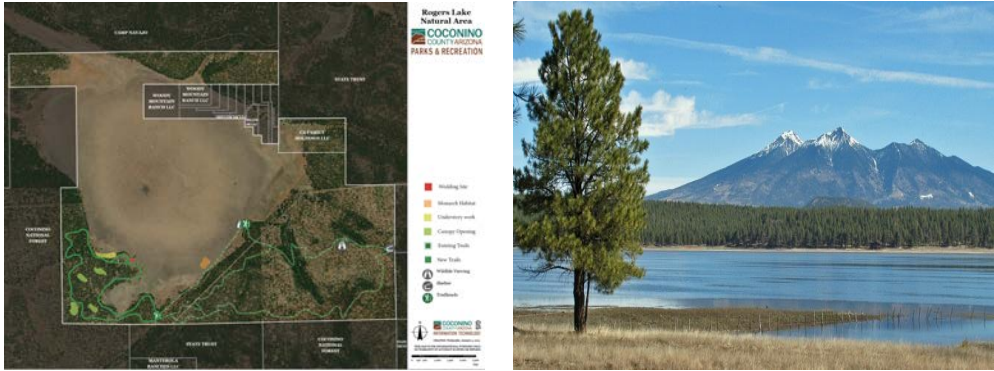

Coconino County Parks and Recreation [CCPR] is planning to develop a multi-use loop trail roughly 3 miles in length on the Frontiere property adjacent to the Rogers Lake County Natural Area. The Frontiere property is located about 5 miles west of the Fort Tuthill County Park roughly 8 miles south of Rt. 66 on Woody Mountain Road outside of Flagstaff. CCPR will start by hiring a consultant to conduct a Cultural Resource Survey of the entire property to ensure historic resources are undisturbed. CCPR will then conduct the ground truthing and trail rough-in in the fall of 2024 and spring 2025. CCPR will then hire a trail crew to conduct the trail treading in the summer of 2025. During the summer of 2025 CCPR will install 4 fence crossings to mitigate the risk of gates being left open adjacent to cattle grazing areas. CCPR will then install one small shade structure with a picnic table next to the trail with views of the San Francisco Peaks in the distance. In Fall 2025 CCPR will install all necessary directional trail signage along the trail corridor.

To prevent damage and preserve a coherent and usable trail system, the NFF is working with Coronado National Forest to adopt and improve trails or close and block unauthorized trails where they intersect with system trails. National Forest Foundation proposes connecting the trail between Finger Rock and Pontatoc Canyon is located within the Pusch Ridge Wilderness and Bighorn Sheep Management Area. Project work will focus on: The final ~1 mile of the existing Pontatoc Canyon Trail will be fully restored, closed to future traffic, and removed from the network. Specific actions will include tread maintenance and construction, vegetation removal, minor rock work for drainage and stabilization, and hazardous tree removal. The addition of this 1.9-mile connector will complete a 6.8-mile loop, providing spectacular hiking and running opportunities and views of Pontatoc Canyon and the greater Tucson valley. The design aims to provide an enjoyable user experience and ensure a sustainable layout that decreases erosion and minimizes maintenance.
