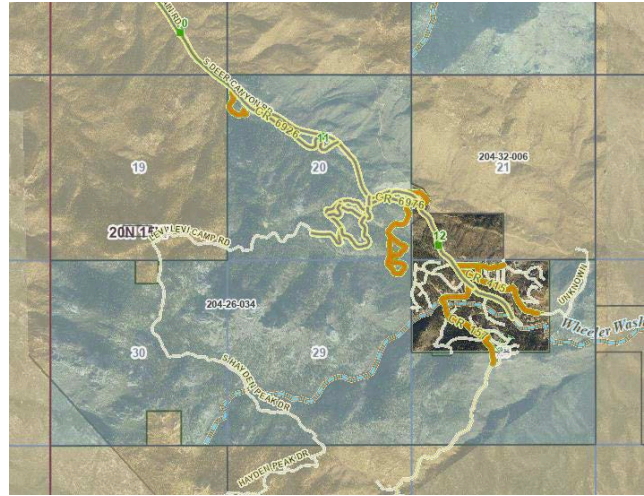

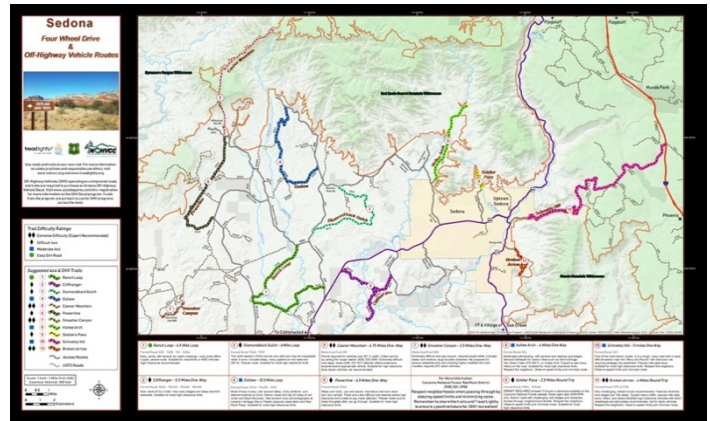

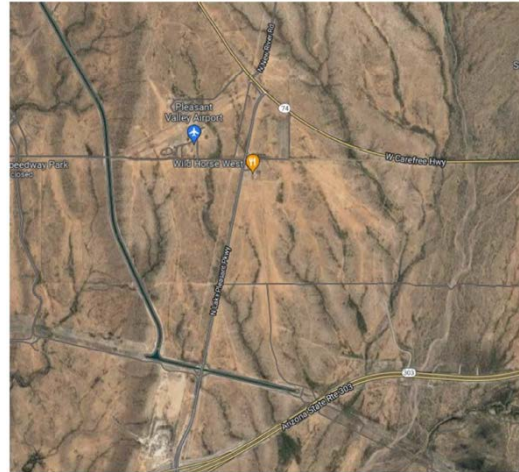

Pinal County Sheriff’s Deputies are experiencing an influx of 9-1-1 generated calls for service in the Public Lands areas. Due to this influx the Pinal County Sheriff’s Office has created a Range Unit to deal with the issues of the Public Lands, OHVs and Grazing Range. This unit will utilize a 3-step program to help combat the issues we are now faces with.

- Education- Range Deputies will hold education programs for the public, through on-site Staging education. Schools, Rental Agencies. We are partnering with AZGFD OHV, BLM and USFS LE Officers to join them in combined education programs.
- Patrol- Range Deputies alone, and in, multi-agency details, with the above-named agencies will conduct on site patrol on a consistent basis for visibility, to educate and to warn.
- Correction- Range deputies with utilize corrective citations, and enforce directly, Arizona Revised Statute Titles 3,17,28,13 on all public lands and OHVs

The Pinal County Sheriff's Office Range Patrol Unit is asking for a Grant in the amount of \$100,000. As a new specialty Law Enforcement Unit within the Pinal County Sheriff's Office and dedicated to a patrol area of approximately 1179 sq miles of Public Lands/OHVs. This money will be used to purchase the following:

- 2 LE packaged side by sides, All safety equipment "four-point harness, roll cage upgrade, fire suppression system, LE custom seats"
- 2 transport trailers

These vehicles will be specifically tasked with, and a critical part to onsite Law Enforcement Saturation Patrolling, education and visibility on Pinal County OHV areas and Public Lands.

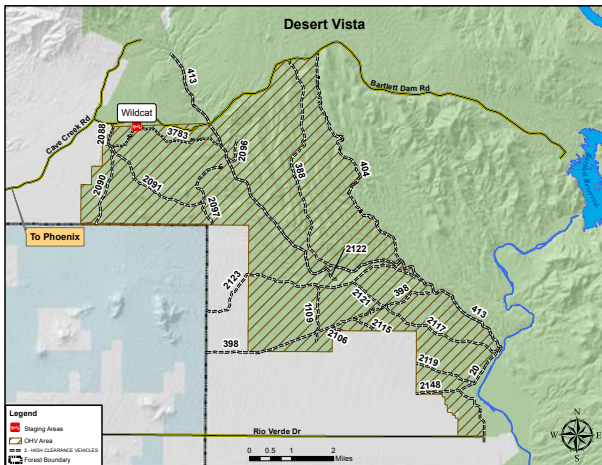

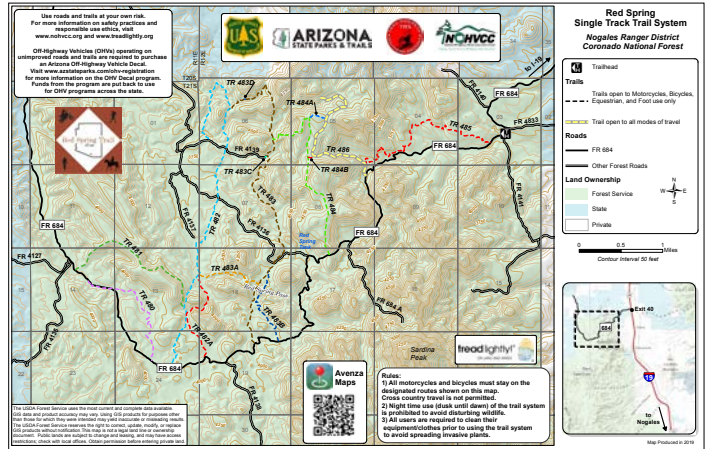
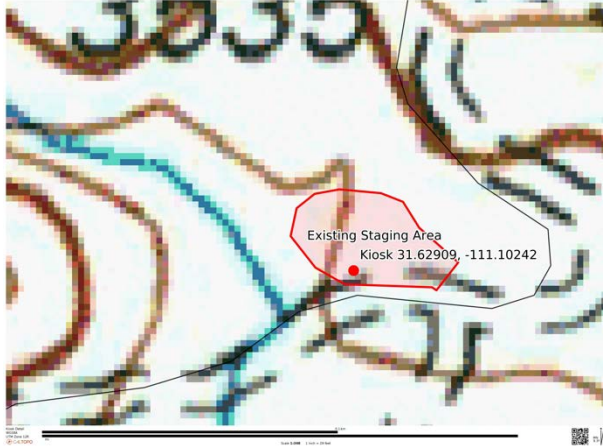

Since project Grant #551506 went through a full NEPA review for the trail and parking/staging area, this new application will utilize all Cultural Clearance forms, support and authorization documentation utilized in Grant #551506 to implement the kiosk. Design, fabrication, and installation of two (2ea) information kiosks for the existing Red Spring Trail staging area. These kiosks will provide a significant amount of information to the user community about the Red Spring Trail system. The information to be posted will include user expectations and behaviors and trail etiquette; important biological, geological, archaeological, environmental statements, and user safety considerations. A Red Spring Trail System map along with a QR code will be posted at the kiosk. This will allow the user the ability to download the trail system map to the “smart phone” Avenza Map application.

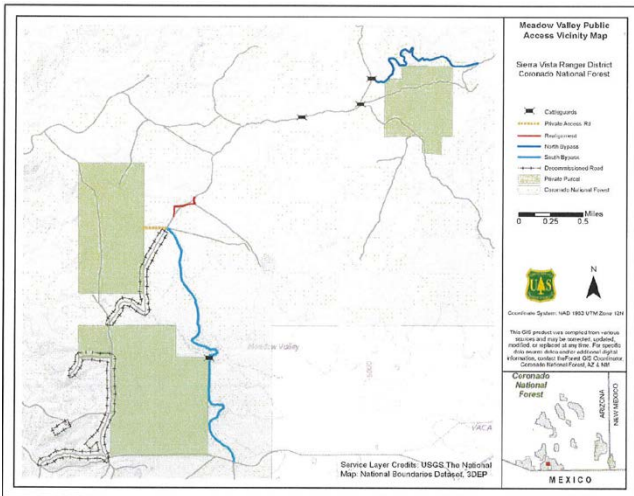

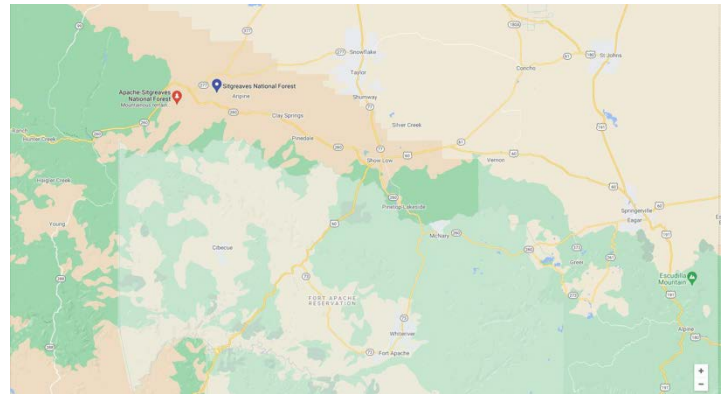

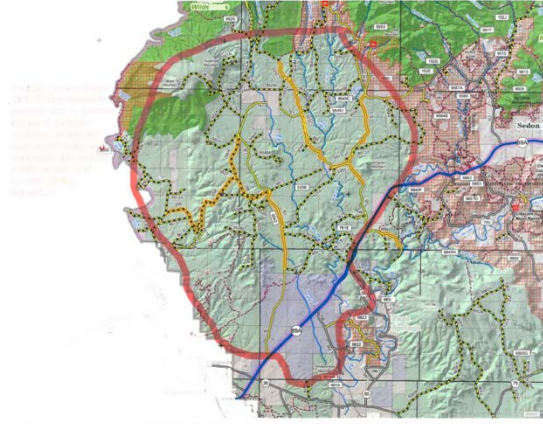

The trailhead is not formally developed and therefore the trail access point is subject to periodic damage. Motorized use when the natural ground is wet has led to the deterioration of the natural landscape and left rutted out tire tracks. The “trailhead” is located on an unsafe blind curve on Salt Mine Road, making access to the trailhead difficult and unsafe. The project is being pursued in order to correct the continued deterioration of the trail access point and to enhance safety.

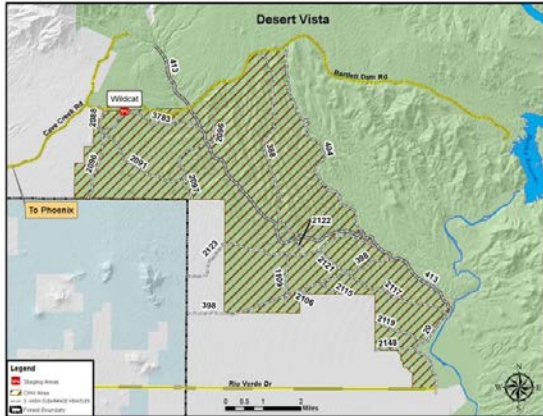


The Cottonwood Police Department will utilize the funds to purchase a side by side Off Highway Vehicle with emergency light package, police radio, and trailer for transporting the vehicle for the purposes of educating the public on Arizona Off Highway Vehicle laws and safety as well as enforcement of Arizona off highway regulations. We currently provide law enforcement on State Trust Land in Yavapai County, Coconino/Prescott National Forests, Dead Horse State Park, in conjunction with US Forest Law Enforcement, State Trust Land Investigators, and other local agencies like the Yavapai County Sheriff's Office. These are high volume Off Highway Vehicle areas partially due to the many Off Highway Vehicle Adventure rental companies in the area. The project would also include assisting our regional partners with additional OHV enforcement operations and public educational opportunities. In addition to OHV enforcement, we will utilize the purchased vehicle for public education on OHV regulations and safety while on patrol and at public events like National Night Out, Dead Horse State Park Verde River Days, and Thunder Valley Rally. The vehicle can also be utilized for environmental clean-up of trash left behind by those utilizing our public lands in conjunction with an alternative sentencing community service work crew program.

The scope of this project is to conduct archaeological inventories of all of the proposed new routes, approved OHV areas, and Tot Lots as required by the TNF Travel Management plan. The TNF will use the funds to contract with a private cultural resources management firm to conduct the inventories and evaluations. The TNF staff will review the results of the evaluations and conduct all the consultation with the Arizona State Historic Preservation Office and consulting tribes in an effort to complete all of the requirements of the National Historic Preservation Act. This will then fulfil the requirements of the Travel Management Plan and allow for the inclusion of the newly approved routes on to the Motor Vehicle Use Maps (MVUM). This MVUM will be the starting point for managing motor vehicle use on the TNF and will allow the Forest to manage motor vehicle use to balance the use with protecting the natural and cultural resources, complying with applicable laws, regulations, and policies, and thereby providing for sustainable motor vehicle recreation opportunities. Moving forward the TNF will be working collaboratively with partners and stakeholders on identifying future program and public needs for including repairs, reroutes, decommissioning, rehabilitation, facilities through future project planning efforts.

Arizona OHV Grant Program

The mission of the Arizona OHV Highway Vehicle Program is to develop vehicle recreation opportunities and educational programs that promote safe, enjoyable, and responsible recreation. The program was established in 1991. The Legislature created the OHV Program in 1991. The Legislature on the funding mechanism at 0.25 percent of the total motor fuel tax revenue in 2009 the state program began and today both funds are used for OHV projects.

Arizona State Parks administers the program through a contractor.

- 60 percent of the funds goes to OHV grants and equipment (2 percent for the administration of the program) and 38 percent for trail maintenance, signage and maps of trails/trails.
- 10 percent goes to the Arizona State Department for law enforcement, education and outreach.
- 2 percent goes to the Arizona State Department for registration, signage and enforcement.

ARIZONA OHV Decal Requirements

The OHV decal program is intended for vehicles designed by the manufacturer to travel over unpaved roads, to have a laden weight of 2000 pounds or less, and/or an engine greater than 40cc. A decal is required for use on all public and state trust lands and must be displayed on the right hand corner of your license plate. Pickups, trucks, SUVs, cars and other recreational vehicles are not required to have an OHV decal.

The decal is not a registration and you are not required to have a registration if you plan to use your vehicle on private property and roads and streets.

Arizona residents will need an Arizona license plate decal. Decals can be ordered at Arizona State Parks. Decals can be ordered through www.azstateparks.com and are good for one year from date of purchase for each vehicle. The cost of the decal is \$25.

An Arizona resident will need to purchase an OHV decal for each vehicle they own. The decal must be purchased prior to using an unpaved road. The decal must be purchased at a retailer authorized through the Arizona Game and Fish Department at gfi.com/OHV/Decal/

Required Equipment for OHVs

Each vehicle operator must have the following equipment on their vehicle: fire extinguisher, first aid kit, safety vest, safety flag and license plate.

What does my permit do? Arizona you need to have an Arizona State Land Recreation Permit, available online at land.gov/permits/recreation.

Arizona State Trust Land is held in trust for the Arizona people, heritage and other educational or charitable beneficiaries. All uses of land and permits go to benefit these beneficiaries.

Avenza Map App

Avenza is a mobile app that allows you to download maps for offline use on an iPhone or Android device. Use your device's built-in GPS to track your location on any map. The app also has other features like location and photos, measure distance and area, and more. The app only uses your camera to download the program and maps, otherwise it uses your GPS.
