

Navajo County proposes restoring a nationally registered historic building, Pinedale Elementary School. To preserve the building architect examined the building. According to the assessment, the exterior of this building needs works at all walls and the roof. These elements have lost their watertightness. Without immediate assistance, these elements will continue to decay, further damaging this historic structure. The needs are in four general areas: 1) Exterior Stucco, 2) Wood Windows, 3) Roof & Roof Edge, and 4) Building Perimeter Grading. The grant requests will be used to address these needed improvements.

Project: Artwork Conservation and Plaster in the Central Dome at Mission San Xavier Awarded Amount: \$149,882.00 Match-\$124,722.00 Total-\$274,604.00





Mission San Xavier was one of the first sites in the nation to be listed as a national historic landmark. In the 1990's conservators were brought in from Europe to accomplish the first-ever conservation of the art within the historic Mission. That initial work involved stabilization of the plaster surfaces supporting the artwork and cleaning and conserving the fragile painted surfaces. The current project involves the highest sections of the church, the interiors of the ornately painted dome and drum above the crossing. This work will involve a major scaffold. Work consists of: assessing and treating areas where moisture may be impacting plaster surfaces, reattaching and stabilizing plaster that is delaminating from the substrate, removing plasters, cleaning the painted surfaces, in-painting to soften voids.

Upon completion of the renovation, the home will be open for public tours facilitated by the Show Low Museum. The home requires repair of the interior/exterior walls and interior flooring is required to further stabilize the structure. Few areas that require replacement include the electrical system and some damaged flooring in the downstairs parlor. Some minor restoration of interior casework is needed. Waterproof elements will be installed as part of the overall renovation to ensure the structural integrity of the foundation is preserved weather elements.

It will be a visual reminder of Vail's railroad and ranching roots while filling current and future needs. Rehabilitation work will involve foundation underpinning, adobe stabilization and repair, exterior lime plastering, replacing the buildings' roof including the addition of interior structural roof supports, restoration of windows, doors, electrical, and ADA compliance. Tech students will assist with the goals of community engagement and sparking their interest in historic preservation.

Pima County developed a comprehensive master plan for the campground in 2020 that inventoried and documented all campground structures. Pima County is funding the development of construction documents to rehabilitate several of the inventoried features. Pima County is applying for this grant to fund the rehabilitation of these important structures in order to preserve the legacy of the CCC and their outstanding contribution to recreation in Tucson Mountain Park.

The remaining adobe wall on the southern end of the building will be repaired. The restored ground-level space will incorporate interpretive history panels highlighting the Mexican-American and African-American history of the building from 1915-1986 and plans for the full interior rehabilitation. The project is being guided by both historic documentation and the Secretary of the Interior's Standards, as the building is on the National Register and a significant site within the National Historic Landmark district nomination. Preservation and rehabilitation of this building is a community priority.

In combination with other funding sources, the Historic Fort Lowell Rehabilitation Project will welcome casual and expert visitors with opportunities to deepen their sense of place and the scope of military operations in the Tucson area

The Edison Impact Hub is an adaptive reuse of the historically significant Crippled Children's Hospital built in 1942 and designed in the Southwestern Mission style. The project work includes preservation and rehabilitation of 48 original steel casement windows, New barrel roof tiles will replace asphalt shingles. Three of the four infilled courtyard breezeways will be reopened by removing the CMU wall infills and steel windows that breezeways were enclosed. The cast-concrete breezeway walls will be rehabilitated with new lath, smooth stucco, and paint sheathings; replacement steel casement windows that replicate the original windows will be installed in the restored courtyard window openings. Fourteen non-period exterior doors will be replaced and the original arched front entry opening will be restored.



When completed, these rooms will provide gallery space for the Dunbar African American Museum and house the Dunbar historic archive. The proposed scope of work consists of interior renovation, including all interior finishes, HVAC equipment and delivery system, and electrical power and lighting; approximately 1000 square feet.

The Pascua Yaqui Tribe (PYT), "The Ewame Voo'o (Thinker) Cultural Trail" will provide cognitive and physical development to tribal children and members. In addition, PYT Social Services Department will partner with Economic Development to combine trails for a unique learning opportunity of immersive curriculum and nature environment that is responsive to the Yoeme Language, history, and culture. Trail Development: 1) 212 LF or 0.04 miles services trail that directly connects the Boys & Girls Club, and PYT Head Start buildings. 2) 157 LF or 0.03 miles to connect and expand to an established trail at the Education building, 3) 139 LF or 0.03 miles for another connecting trail at Head Start, and 4) two cultural educational trail crossings totaling 0.14 miles that will both connect to the existing trail adjacent to the Education building. Nature of Work: (1) Fun Tri-Lingual signage for social development and teaching in English, Spanish and Yoeme Language, (2) Interpretive protective signage of native plants and animals with QR-Codes boxes, (3) Have cultural art, shaded benches, trails markers, and solar lighting of the pathways. Scope of Work: An 8' stabilized decomposed granite pathways to be constructed with 3" depth stabilized decomposed granite compacted subgrade undisturbed native soil. Total trail length is .34 miles with ADA guidelines.

This grant will assist with providing two benches alongside the trail. In addition, the surface in the parking area / trail head parking will be improved by slurry sealing and new striping.

The National Forest Foundation (NFF) proposes a 2-year project to rehabilitate 7 non-motorized, multiuse trails on the Coronado National Forest. The trails were heavily damaged in 2020 by the Bighorn Fire, with nearly 120,000 acres burned. The summer's monsoon season resulted in flooding, washouts, and vegetation growth, exacerbating damage. Using volunteers along with a skilled crew, NFF will work with the Forest to re-open these trails. The work will focus on identifying, marking, and removing vegetation from the trail alignments to improve the safety and quality of users' experience and to protect sensitive areas. Also, repairing heavily damaged trail sections by constructing natural stone structures to remove water, stabilize tread and prevent future erosion, and rebuilding tread surface where needed.

All major trails of the WMTS are loops, with connector trails forming a trail system. There are many areas across the Lakeside district that are fenced for cattle grazing, so installation of these ramp gates will improve and facilitate trail usage of hikers and mountain bikers, as well as keep cattle secure since users often forget to close gates. Each ramp gate will be installed in an existing fence line beside an existing gate so that hikers and mountain bikers will not have to open or close the existing gate. Making non-motorized trails more accessible and user friendly, and keeping cattle more secure.



Funding will be used for boat rentals, signs and printing, notebooks, radios, transportation, insurance and event costs.

Other than using a small soil pH meter, no soils will be disturbed in this project. The outcomes from this project will be a healthier, better-understood and more diverse ecosystem, and a cohort of students who understand the mathematics, statistics, biology and recreational management of a riparian system.
