The Payson Ranger District of the Tonto National Forest along with Pine Strawberry Fuel Reduction group have identified several miles of trail on the Pine Creek Canyon Trail #26 that requires advanced tread maintenance and sustainable drainage improvements to increase durability of trail over time. Some washed out sections of the trail and downed trees across trail have left ruts and holes in the trail. This is a multiuse non-motorized trail by hikers/bikers/horses. For this project the Payson Ranger District and the Pine Strawberry Fuels Reduction Inc. would be seeking to partner with a trail crew for several crew hitches to provide routine trail maintenance that does not involve any new ground disturbance on roughly 5 miles of the Pine Canyon Trail #26 between the Pine Trailhead and the backside of the Camp Lo Mia property. The project area has not been maintained for more than 7 years and contains a lot of sluff area (Sand and loose dirt) that can wash away easily.
