

Program Mission: To assist Arizona's public land managers in the protection of archaeological sites and promote public awareness through education about the cultural sensitivity of these resources and their significance to descendent communities

Program Timeline

- ➤ 1986 Gov. Bruce Babbitt convenes advisory group, discussion on looting, destruction of archaeological sites in AZ.
- ➤ 1987 Site Steward Program established under Governor's Archaeological Advisory Commission, First of its kind nationally
- Partnerships US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and State Lands
- Initial funding provided by the State Legislature, USFS, BLM and Arizona State Land Department.
- 1988 50 Stewards monitoring 200 sites

Recognition:

- ➤ 1993 Program receives "Points of Light" award from President George Bush
- > 1995 National BLM "Making a Difference" award
- ➤ 2005 Society for American Archaeology for Excellence in Cultural Resource Management





AZ Site Steward Program recognized nationally as the model for other states

Program Timeline

- ≥ 2009
 - Over 700 Stewards monitoring 1700 sites
 - 18,000-23,000 hours submitted each year
 - Damage reports doubled over 100 per year
- 2017 Site Steward Foundation (501c3) is formed
- 2018 Sean Hammond becomes Site Steward Coordinator
- ➤ 2019 Largest Site Steward Conference to date held at Grand Canyon (160+ stewards attended; 20+ presenters, guests, tribal reps)
- 2019 Project Archaeology BLM, SSP & SHPO, Foundation, ASU, NPS; 2020 Committee Formed, 2 master instructors;
 - Sept 2022 -AZ Dept of Education approved curriculum accessible to AZ teachers
- ➤ 2021/22 40,000 volunteer hours reported. 260 new applicant registrations submitted
- ➤ 2023 550-600 active members monitoring 2,604 sites
- \triangleright 2023 7 stewards part of the 30 year club!





What Site Stewards Do...

- Regular visits to sites, documentation
- Discourage vandalism, sale of antiquities
- Protect site location information

Site Mitigation & Stabilization

 Special Land Manager projects, protect sites from complete damage, remove graffiti, fencing, recording sites

- Increase public awareness significance of cultural resources to descendant communities


