



Arizona State Parks and Trails Administrative Rules.

What is a Rule and Rulemaking

- A Rule is an agency statement of general applicability that implements, interprets, or prescribes law or policy, or describes the procedures or practice requirements of an agency (A.R.S. 41-1001(17)).
- A rule is the result of rulemaking by a state agency, board or commission.
 Rules are created in Arizona as final, expedited, exempt, and emergency rules.
- The term "rulemaking" refers to the process of adopting rules, as well the document that an agency files with the Secretary of State to update the agency's rules in the Arizona Administrative Code. Rulemakings are governed by the state's Administrative Procedure Act, the Secretary of State's rules and publication guidelines, as well as the Governor's Regulatory Review Council's own rules.

Why is Rulemaking Necessary

- The primary purpose of rule-making is to give notice to the public of the substantive and procedural requirements that an agency has established for activities falling within its statutory authority. No rules are permitted that exceed statutory or constitutional authority.
- An agency can create substantive policy statements to explain how the agency will enforce a rule, but the substantive policy statement itself cannot be enforced on the general public. (A.R.S. § 41-1033). Rules are generally favored over substantive policy statements, as the rulemaking process provides a formal avenue for public participation through the notice and comment process.

Why is Rulemaking Important to ASPB


- ASPB may make reasonable rules for the protection of, and maintain and keep the peace in, state parks and monuments. Such rules adopted by the parks board are subject to review and approval by the legislature (ARS § 41-511.05(9)).
- Every five years, Arizona agencies must submit reports to the Governor's Regulatory Review Council on their rules for review and approval. These are called 5-year-review reports. The reports are intended to be a concise written analysis of an agency's administrative rules that covers the previous 5 years.
- In 2019, our agency submitted a 5-year-review report to the Governor's Regulatory Review Council which described that ASPB will be updating it's rules before the next report is due which will be in 2024.

Why is Rulemaking Important to ASPB, cont.

- Park fees need to be updated. The only way to do this
 is to update the rules. If the rules are not updated,
 the park fees cannot be updated.
- ASPB has not updated the rules since the previous administration.
- Updating our rules, or at least starting the process of updating the rules shows the Arizona Auditor General that the agency is doing what we say we were going to do from the 5-year-review report.

Next Steps

- Our rulemaking will be separated into two sets. The first set of rules that will be worked on will be the fee sections. After those rules are complete, the rest of the rules will be updated.
- Currently, there is a working rules draft of the fee sections.
 Once that draft is final, the final draft will be discussed with the Board and filed with the Secretary of State's office.
- Along with the legislative updates for the 2022 legislative session, I will include rule updates as needed for the Board.


